From the AWF-UMW Conference Secretary

Did you know? A Corporate **Secretary** is required by state corporation laws for every corporation. A key responsibility of the Corporate **Secretary** is to ensure that Board members **have** the proper advice and resources for discharging their fiduciary duties to shareholders under state law.



Did you know? Our Alabama-West Florida UMW Conference LEADERSHIP TEAM should include at least a president, treasurer, **secretary** and the chair of the committee on nominations. Additional persons may be named either at-large or in the designated roles approved by the conference. Additional teams or committees may be formed as needed to fulfill the Purpose.

Did you know? The Policies of our Alabama-West Florida UMW includes language for outgoing officers for the conference Secretary that include "C. Conference Secretary should keep all minutes, Standing Rules and Policies, list of conference officers and other important documents in a permanent binder. As much as possible all records should be digitized and stored on the Alabama West Florida Conference United Methodist Women's Drop Box."

Did you know? The Standing Rules & Policies of our Alabama-West Florida UMW includes language that requires the Executive Mission Team Standing Rules & Policies committee review the "Rules & Policies" annually and presents any "Rules" changes before the voting UMW membership in attendance for approval during the meeting that includes elections. The **secretary** is a member of this review committee.

I recently found this installation question for a Secretary in an officer installation program: "SECRETARY: Will you study to know all the correct terminology so you can keep a clear and accurate history of this conference organization? Our connectional system means that there are persons in other places who need information about this conference. Will you see that this information is recorded and sent to the appropriate places? If so, answer 'I will, with God's help."

We may need to know several UMW organizational "things to do," but the one thing we must always remember—*We will* seek God's help and He will equip & encourage us. As we begin to re-gather the AWF-UMW membership post-pandemic, let us continue our commitment to encourage others to join our mission and focus our Pledge to Mission funds to help women, children, and youth.

AWF-UMW Education & Interpretation

Mission u: Learning Together for the Transformation of the World

It is time to start promoting the AWF-UMW Virtual Mission u to your units. This issue of the Alert provides details on the courses and leaders. Please encourage members as well as friends and anyone interested in social justice to participate this year. It will never be easier or less expensive to experience Mission u. Since our pledges and love offerings help support Mission u, participants will have an excellent education for the low fee of \$10 plus \$15 for each



book. That is a total of \$40 for two classes or \$25 for one class. If you have registered for educational seminars, you know that is an incredible bargain for 6 or12 hours of instruction plus worship opportunities. Since Mission u will be on Zoom with no additional travel or room expenses, it is very affordable for anyone who wishes to participate. For those without reliable access to the internet, small groups may wish to meet together to participate in the same class. Please note that everyone participating in a shared class will need to register individually and purchase a book. The link on the AWF-UMW.org website also has a flyer and a printable registration form for distribution. If you already have your study guides, you will need to use the mailin registration to indicate that you already have your book(s) and only need to pay the \$10 Mission u registration fee.

Mission u is a win-win for everyone. Having two members from one unit attending Mission u satisfies item 11 on the Mission Today form and having a mission study at the district, unit, or circle level also satisfies item 4. Under the train-the-trainer model, study leaders have attended national training events to be prepared to facilitate a mission study at the conference level. After attending a conference Mission u event, you are then encouraged to facilitate the study in your district or local groups. A team of qualified facilitators can each be responsible for a section to share the workload.

For those participating in the Reading Program, all mission studies count as a bonus book (2 books in one category). For more details see the Program Resources section of this article.



Voices from the Field events are held quarterly and are great resources to help interpret the need to give. This virtual conversation series features leaders sharing their work and life stories, and highlights how United Methodist Women initiatives supported by your mission giving significantly improve the lives of women, children and youth around the world. Program Resources

Reading Program Catalogue: For 2021–2022, participants can read books from the 2015 through the 2022reading lists.

You do not need to complete one of the plans to be recognized as a Reading Program participant. Please complete a reading report form to get credit for your reading and help your district win the Reading Worm for 2021.

Reading Book Reporting Form: The completed reading forms should be given to your local president for the Consolidated President's Report, so she can complete her report by November 30. **Participation:** Anyone can participate in the Reading Program and all can receive a certificate for participating. To meet the Mission Today Criteria 9, at least one unit member must be a participant in the Reading Program.

Here are some alternative ways to increase reading participation.

Download books onto an e-reader to pass around and share. This is an excellent idea for those who need large print books.

Faith Talks: Faith Talk podcasts can now be counted in the category of Spiritual Growth. You must participate or listen to two Faith Talks podcasts to count as one book in the Spiritual Growth category. If you listen to three, it will be counted as two books.

Movies: Watching these movies and documentaries will also count toward the Reading Program:

- 1. Just Mercv
- 2. The Hate U Give
- 3. Pushout

Children and youth books can be found within each of the categories and count toward the certificate. Read to a child/youth or enjoy them yourself.

Bonus books: These count as two books in different categories.

Rise! From Caged Bird to Poet of the People, Maya Angelou- two books in Leadership Development

The Mission u studies also count as Bonus Books:

Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools by Monique W. Morris (as well as the Leader's Guide by Vanessa M. Wilson) counts as two books in Social Action Women United for Change 50 Years in Mission by Ellen Blue counts as two books in Nurturing for Community.

Finding Peace in An Anxious World edited by Erin James-Brown- counts as two books in Spiritual Growth

Books often raise concerns about people, countries and issues. Bring these concerns to God during your prayer time at home and at group meetings. Blessings on your journey as you are transformed and seek to transform the world,

Charter for Racial Justice

The United States—a nation of many peoples of different races, nationalities, languages and cultures—is challenged to make the Charter for Racial Justice a charter for everyone. The Charter for Racial Justice was created and adopted by the Women's Division of the United Methodist General Board of Global Ministries in 1978. In 1980 the division successfully recommended adoption of the charter by the whole denomination. General Conference has consecutively readopted it, every eight years since, most recently in 2016. The charter continues United Methodist Women's urgent call for study and action on the principles and goals of its vision.

For Unit Enrichment:

- Display Charter for Racial Justice Policies AND lift up at least 1 issue at each unit meeting.
- Supply each member with a copy of the Charter for Racial Justice Policies.
- Purchase & discuss one United Methodist Women's Reading Program book about a different culture or written by someone of a different racial ethnic background.
- Study in depth a particular issue relating to the Charter for Racial Justice Policies.



There's Far More Here THAN MEETS THE EYE



Mission u, like many activities in our lives, has moved online. While virtual, we are still creating spaces for spiritual community, lifelong friendships, lessons that change us and our communities, and spiritual practices that arrive when we need them most. In a time when it looks like things are falling apart on us, God's grace is still unfolding and life is being made new. Indeed: There's far more here than meets the eye. Will you join us?

At our upcoming Mission u (produced in cooperation with GNTV), we will examine anxiety, the culture of violence that impacts children in and out of schools, and how we as God's people can deepen our moral witness and respond faithfully.

Our 2021 Mission u will offer the following studies (you may take one class Friday and one Saturday)

- Finding Peace in an Anxious World, edited by Erin James-Brown. The four chapters, each written by a different Urban Village Church leader, focus on different aspects of the Serenity Prayer—serenity, acceptance, courage, and wisdom—and each concludes with a spiritual practice to help further develop the featured characteristic in your life.
- * **Pushout:** The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools by Monique Morris. Pushout shows how even with obstacles, stigmas, stereotypes and despair, black girls still find ways to breathe remarkable dignity into their lives in classrooms, juvenile facilities and beyond, and challenges the rest of us to do the same.
- * Bearing Witness in the Kin-dom: Living into the Church's Moral Witness Through Radical Discipleship by Darryl W. Stephens. The purpose of this study is to help the church and its members discern our call and bear witness to the will of God for a more just world.
- Join us: Online July 22-24, 2021 (must register by July 12). Opening Worship is Thursday, July 22, 6:30-7:30 pm; Studies are July 23 & 24, 8:30 am-5:00 pm, including opening, breaks & plenaries. Continuing Education Credit is available. All donations will be given to the Equal Justice Initiative (Montgomery, AL).
- * **Register:** https://www.awf-umw.org/ or mail in form to AWF-UMW Mission u, 3043 Headland Avenue, Dothan, AL 36303. Registration cost is \$10 plus \$15 per class (study book is included in class fee). Total cost for all sessions is \$40. 

Deaconess Celeste Eubanks, is the Director of Leadership Strategies for the Alabama-West Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church in Montgomery, AL. A native of Slidell, LA, Celeste was christened and nurtured in the Christian faith at Mt. Olive African Methodist Episcopal Church.

Celeste received her Bachelors degree in Business Administration from the University of Southern Mississippi and her Masters degree in Communication and Leadership Studies from Gonzaga University (Spokane, WA). Upon graduating

from USM, Celeste accepted a job in Mobile, AL working as a software developer for CPSI (a healthcare information systems company), and later transitioned to Human Resources at the same company.

While in Mobile, Celeste became a member of Toulminville-Warren St. United Methodist Church and later joined St. John United Methodist Church and served there until moving to Montgomery. It was while serving at St. John that Celeste answered her call to become a Deaconess in the United Methodist Church – making a lifetime commitment to full-time vocation in ministries of love, justice, and service. Celeste was consecrated as a Deaconess in May 2018 at the United Methodist Women's Assembly in Columbus, OH.
