As I write this, it is All Saint's Day, November 1. This is a day when Catholics and some Protestant denominations honor those who have entered heaven.

While reflecting on the significance of All Saint's Day, I remembered several ladies in the history of the United Methodist Church who deserve to be honored today. Susanna Wesley is the first woman that came to mind. As most United Methodists know, she was the mother of Charles and John Wesley, along with 17 other children, 19 in all! Can you imagine? Nine children died as infants, with 2 sets of twins among those. Her husband was often absent, and she assumed the role of being the primary source of her children's education. She set apart time every week to spend individual time with each child. An interesting fact was their home burned down 2 times, and son John nearly died and had to be rescued from the second story window. Susanna wrote several pieces, including meditations and spiritual commentaries, that had major impact on her children, especially John and Charles.

Two other women who made a significant impact on United Methodist Women. Mrs. William Butler and Mrs. Edwin Parker, wives of missionaries to India, were home on furlough. They spoke to eight women in Boston about the spiritual and physical needs of women in India. These women gathered other women and organized the Methodist Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. These women raised funds and sent an educator and doctor to India. A third woman, Mrs. Lizzie Hoffman was instrumental in forming the Women's Missionary Association of the United Brethren Church. As the denominations merged, various women's groups continued to organize until in 1973, United Methodist Women became the women's mission organization of The United Methodist Church.

Each year during our annual memorial service, our District honors the memory of those from our local units who have entered heaven. These beloved sisters and members of each United Methodist Women's unit have continued the tradition of "service, worship, standing up, stepping up, and making our voices heard" in the world to positively impact the lives of women, children and youth.

What is truly amazing about all of those referenced above and others each reader remembers is they were not trying to leave a legacy for themselves but were focused on sharing the faith in Jesus each of them had with those that followed them. The lyrics from a

song resonate with me about their mission and purpose. "Only Jesus" by Casting Crowns says, "I don't want to leave a legacy. I don't care if they remember me. Only Jesus. And I, I've only got one life to live, I'll let every second point to Him, Only Jesus."

As we contemplate the meaning of All Saint's Day and the lives of the women who have contributed in unimaginable ways to the mission of the United Methodist Church, may we remember their goal was not to build a legacy for themselves but to let their lives point others to Jesus. And, as we live our own lives, as we build our legacies (as we all do), let us commit to let "every second" we live point others to Jesus, because "Jesus is the only name to remember."

Treasurer's Reminder

Dear Ladies,

As of November 30, 2019, I have received the following donations:

Undesignated Giving:

(Pledges, Special Recognition Pins, Gifts to Mission, Gifts in Memory, and World Thanks Banks apply to the District's Pledge. These are also the contributions that make a unit a 5-Star Unit.)

Pledges: 75.5% of \$13,000 pledge for 2019: \$9,819.93

Designated Givng: (These monies are earmarked for specific projects.)

Prayer and Self-Denial: \$1,736.85 Conference Love Offerings: \$2,575.00 Legacy: \$302.00 Supplemental Gifts: \$124.00

Although we didn't meet our district's pledge for 2019 of \$13,000, I think it is significant that we made 75.5% of our pledge during this challenging year after Michael's visit. Next year's pledge is \$11,000. We have approximately 325 members, so we'll need about \$34 per member to achieve that. Of course, the amount we pledge individually is a personal decision, but don't forget that the missions we support involve people who are generally so much worse off than we are.

While we don't pay dues to be a member of UMW, the \$10 Conference Love Offering is requested to fund worthy projects throughout the Alabama-West Florida Conference. Sometimes units give more than the requested \$10 Love Offering simply because they know of specific needs in the conference. That's what makes UMW members so special: as soon as they learn of specific areas where they can make a difference, they jump into action!

We can also celebrate the fact that 8 units made Five-Star status in giving this year. When we consider all we've had to face recently, we have done very well!

I look forward to working with all of you this year.


