

PRESIDENT'S THOUGHTS

When I first joined in with the Mission of United Methodist Women at my church, I recall our Annual Pledge Service in the Circle meeting. We would all be given the "Membership Joys" tri-fold Pledge card and the treasurer would also give us a blank envelope that contained a 3X5 index card. The Pledge program would include information from the program book or just from memory. Once the treasurer finished her plea to pledge, we'd each sit in silence and contemplate what to give to UMW. I remember reading that Membership Joys foldout because it had "I Commit!" section that included these statements of I Commit and I Celebrate Mission:

- I Commit: **My Prayers**, That I will grow and renew my relationship with God and others; **My Time**, That I will respond to human need through study, reflection and action; **My financial gifts**, That I will share in the global ministries of the church through United Methodist Women.
- I Celebrate: I will make the most of learning opportunities and mission-education events; I will expand concepts of mission, including social justice as mission; I will engage in mission studies at schools of Christian mission; I will read response magazine and join the Reading program; I will be empowered by the history and heritage of United Methodist Women.

Then I'd tear at the perforated part of the Pledge card, and right there at the sentence "For the coming year, I pledge \$_____ to be paid.... and I'd choose yearly, but there were options for monthly or quarterly. I'd tear at that perforated part of the card, stick in my envelope with my check; seal it and hand back to the treasurer.

I couldn't ever get anyone to tell me how much to pledge, they'd always say that's between you and God. And so, God and I would go back and forth about how much to write that check for, just like we always did (still do) with the tithing check (but that's another His-story!)

I love God and Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit, and I know that powerful Trinity loves us all. Our United Methodist Women organization loves turning Faith, Hope and Love into Action on behalf of women, children and youth around the world. The Pledge card has been renovated somewhat, it's still trifold, it still has the perforated part that I write down my Pledge for the coming year, it includes a bit more info about what we do and who can join and now says "What is United Methodist Women?"

Now, all that to say it's not a requirement for membership but, My Pledge and your Pledge is how United Methodist Women totally funds our Mission for women, children and youth around the World. We do not receive any funding from anywhere except our purses, the bake sale proceeds, the soup sales and the yard sales we host or work annually.

God knows, your continued support and Pledges to United Methodist Women is so appreciated.

From your Conference Treasurer

In 2018, the combined Alabama West Florida Conference districts surpassed its Pledge goal of \$121,450 by donating \$128,286 to missions. For the 2019 year, the districts have pledged \$126,000 to mission giving.

Why is this important? Because each member of the United Methodist Women in the Alabama West Florida Conference is responsible for helping to meet this pledge. If you call yourself a UMW member, then you have an obligation to support the purpose of the United Methodist Women so that this organization can achieve its mission of helping women, children and youth, locally, regionally, nationally and internationally.

Neither the district nor the conference raises funds. It depends on the individual members to donate to their local units. The local units in return send a portion of their funds whether it be from individual donations or from fund raisers held in the local unit, keeping some in its coffers to pay its own administrative costs and to support local missions in its area. The district then sends 100% of those funds it receives from the local unit on to the Conference. The Conference, after deducting a small percentage to fund its and the districts administration and membership development, then sends that money to our National headquarters.

National, through grants and other support donates millions of dollars annually to groups, organizations and institutions that have been thoroughly vetted through a stringent process. They include over 90 institutions in the US and many international projects. The funds are also used for leadership development of women and to voice our concerns for social injustices. To see the wide and varied ways, go to the National website <https://www.unitedmethodistwomen.org> and search for mission giving stories or read the *response* magazine for stories on how our dollars support missions for women, children and youth. In 2017, the last available year yet audited, The United Methodist Women spent almost \$35 Million dollars on programs, services and support here and abroad.

Therefore, without your individual support, UMW cannot function. It depends on your support through mission giving. We each together can achieve much, divided and singly not as much. Let us stand together as one, all for the power and glory of the one we serve. We are Christ's hands and feet starting in the pocketbooks of our individual member. Make 2019 your year of showing that support by giving to your local unit. Then make sure your local unit sends its share to the district.

How much do we require each member to give? That is your choice. It is between you and God. In UMW, we don't set a certain amount each should give. But do know, that the \$10 giving to your Love Offering per member, isn't the same as your pledge, nor is the Call to Prayer or other restricted line items, even though they are sent to National. The \$10 per member stays in our Conference; the Pledge is used outside our conference. The pledge does consist of unrestricted pledges, World Thank Offering, mission cards, memorials and Special Mission Recognition pins. Christ did tell us to help our neighbors and to go out into the world and spread his love.

But let me leave this last thought with you – let's each celebrate our 150 years of this great organization this year by increasing your individual pledge and your local pledge so that we surpass our total AWF-UMW pledge goal. I look forward to serving you in 2019. As always, I am here to help in anyway whether in your district, local unit or an individual.

It is also a great time to get a new book or two and enjoy some quite time. As most of you know by now, the Reading Program books will no longer be available for purchase at our Conference AWF-UMW Events. The process for getting your own Reading Program books are now available on Kindle while hard copies can be purchased through Amazon, Cokesbury, Barnes & Nobel or Books a Million. Some also may be available through your local library. So please continue your reading program in your local units. Below are a few suggestions that you might find interesting. You won't be disappointed! God Bless! And Enjoy!

- **EDUCATION FOR MISSION:** "Threading My Prayer Rug" by Sabeeha Rehman, is a richly textured reflection on what it is to be a Muslim in America today. Beginning with a sweetly funny, moving account of her arranged marriage, the author undercuts stereotypes and offers a refreshing view of an American life through Muslim eyes.
- **LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT:** "Fresh Expressions - A New Kind of Methodist Church for People Not in Church" by Kenneth H. Carter, Jr. and Audrey Warren. Join the wave of new Methodist churches that are emerging to reach un-churched and de-churched people living in an increasingly non-religious and multi-religious culture. These new faith communities listen to people and meet them where they are on their journey toward Jesus. They are deeply ecumenical without losing their distinctiveness because they learn fresh ways to communicate their identity through faithful discipleship.
- **NURTURING FOR COMMUNITY:** "Hope for the Future - Answering God's Call to Justice for Our Children" by Shannon Daley-Harris. In this time when it appears our children's future is bleak, and children across our nation face many challenges, "Hope for the Future" brings us reflections that move us beyond what we know to be true about the state of our children to a place that challenges how we live into our responsibilities as children of God. Using stories that echo Scripture to inspire teachers, pastors, caregivers and parents to look, listen and "move our feet" in order to care for all of God's "little ones".
- **SOCIAL ACTION:** "Where Do We Go from Here - Chaos or Community?" by Martin Luther King, Jr. In 1967 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. isolated himself from the demands of the civil rights movement, rented a house in Jamaica with no telephone, and labored over his final manuscript. This prophetic work, unavailable for more than 10 years, lays out his thoughts, plans and dreams for America's future, including the need for better jobs, higher wages, decent housing and quality education. With a universal message of hope that continues to resonate, Dr. King demanded an end to global suffering, asserting that humankind, for the first time, had the resources and technology to eradicate poverty.
- **SPIRITUAL GROWTH:** "Be Still - Departure from Collective Madness" by Gordon C. Stewart & Eric Ringham. "Be Still" echoes the call of the Navaho sage, and the psalmist who invited their hearers to stop - and be still. These thought-provoking essays zoom in on singular moments of time where the world is making headlines, drawing attention to the sin of exceptionalism in its national, racial, religious, cultural and species manifestations.

Education and Interpretation

We fund our PURPOSE by pairing our resources with our passion for mission. The last phrase of our United Methodist Women PURPOSE is **to expand concept of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.** In 2017, over \$29 Million was disbursed for national and international program services. United Methodist Women awarded \$1 M for international project grants and \$300,000 for scholarships worldwide. The main source of that funding was our Pledge to Mission and the 4 other channels of Gift in Memory and Gift to Mission cards, the World Thank Offering, and Special Mission Recognition pins. Call to Prayer offerings help fund grants.

Our task as Education and Interpretation Mission Coordinators is *to help members make an emotional connection with the lives changed by our mission funds that flow through the National United Methodist Women organization to the national and international mission agencies.* By highlighting a personal story of an agency participant or missionary at each Unit or Circle meeting, you will help keep our passion for missions alive.

Our mission dollars provided training and inspiration for Soon-duk Woo, director of Sunlit Sisters Center, near the DMZ in South Korea. Through a Call to Prayer Technology program, the purchase of computers and other accompanying equipment provided digital education and internet access to elderly Korean women and Filipina migrant workers in Anjeong-ri camp. Below is their story shared through the photojournalism of Paul Jeffrey in the October 2018 response magazine.



“The old woman sits alone in her tiny room—a small electric heater failing to keep at bay the winter cold that seeps through the walls. Her only company is a pair of dogs she rescued off the streets of Anjeong-ri, the grim neighborhood where she lives adjacent to Camp Humphreys, the largest overseas United States military base. Young-mi Jang is 70. She and many other elderly women in the neighborhood came to Anjeong-ri when they were young in order to work in the bars and clubs where they sold their bodies to soldiers.” These are the forgotten women of South Korea who were used as “patriotic prostitutes” to American soldiers. The Korean government who once hailed them as national heroes in the 1960s and provided for their health and safety now have neglected them and left them alone. Jang and her friends have found a safe place at the Sunlit Sisters Center located in the middle of their neighborhood, a

space where they can be themselves, laugh together and share meals and worship. It was not easy for Soon-duk Woo, a women’s leader in the Korean Methodist Church and now director of Sunlit Sisters Center to gain the trust of the women. The United Methodist Women gave Woo, a seminary graduate who chose to focus on women’s issues, a full scholarship to study social work in South Korea. While attending a United Methodist Women’s conference in Wisconsin, she heard about a church ministry with former sex workers and decided to begin a ministry with the forgotten ladies in South Korea. Through our mission dollars, these women are experiencing the grace of God and receiving faith, hope and especially, love in action.

Mission giving is not a question of how much my fair share is but how can I change lives through my gifts of prayer, time and dollars.

150 Years in Mission**

United for Change by Ellen Blue is the first in a two-year study commemorating United Methodist Women's 150 anniversary in 2019. It will provide a historical survey of United Methodist Women and its predecessor organizations and amplify the voices that shaped the work through an overarching story of United Methodist Women changing the fact of mission. This study is about women who established vibrant societies to support

missions. First organized in the United States, those societies sent missionaries overseas and later engaged in mission at home. Each was a heroine who was willing to stand over and against what her culture--and sometimes even her church - expected of her. Learning about the early female leaders who created what would become today's United Methodist Women can help us understand who they truly were beyond who we expected them *to* have been.

Through this connection between our faith and our money, our readers discover how to live closer to God and God's people, even in our North American culture that is so deeply defined by money.
